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Published Statistics: Pupil Attendance in Schools

- Information on the <u>levels of overall, authorised and</u> <u>unauthorised absence</u> in state-funded primary, secondary and special schools from September 2022 onwards is published each week. The data includes daily, weekly and year-to-date information on attendance and absence, in addition to reasons for absence.
- The figures are published as experimental official statistics to give an indicative figure for the absence rate during the 2023/24 academic year. A national level figure was published on 7 September 2023 and from 28 September 2023 the <u>pupil attendance dashboard</u> will be updated fortnightly, providing aggregate metrics on overall absence and reasons for absence estimated at national, regional and local authority level only.

This will also give you, your local authority and your multi-academy trust (if applicable) <u>access to daily attendance reports</u> to help identify pupils needing attendance support earlier.
- Schools can also use the '<u>Compare your attendance</u>' dashboard to compare with other schools in the local authority. This has been updated to show data for this current academic year. Use it to compare absence and unauthorised absence for your school, as well as special educational needs and free school meals pupils
 This release covers the period 11 September 2023 to 26 January 2024, with data relating to 5-15 year olds in state funded primary, secondary and special schools in England.

Headline Facts

 The attendance rate was 92.2% across all schools in the week commencing 22 January 2024 (absence rate 7.8%). Across the academic year, the attendance rate was 93.1% (absence rate 6.9%).

- This page summarises future **assessment dates in primary schools** 2023/24, 2024/25 & 2025/26, to assist schools with their forward planning.
- Early years foundation stage profile assessment: Schools must complete the early years foundation stage profile assessment between April and June of the academic year in which children turn 5, which is usually the reception year.
- Optional key stage 1 tests: It is recommended that the optional key stage 1 tests are administered during **May 2024**. Schools can opt-out of receiving papers.
- Key stage 2 tests: The statutory key stage 2 tests are timetabled from Monday 13 May to Thursday 16 May 2024
 - Monday 13 May 2024: English grammar, punctuation and spelling papers 1 and 2
 - Tuesday 14 May 2024: English reading
 - Wednesday 15 May 2024: Mathematics papers 1 and 2
 - Thursday 16 May 2024: Mathematics paper 3
- Multiplication tables check: Schools must administer the multiplication tables check within the 2week period from Monday 3 June 2024.
- Phonics screening check: Schools must administer the phonics screening check within the 1week period from Monday 10 June 2024.

16 to 19 funding: maths and English condition of funding. Minimum teaching hours for English and maths

- To meet the condition of funding from the academic year 2024 to 2025, students must study eligible qualifications for a minimum number of hours per week. For full-time students this is 3 hours per week for English and 4 hours for maths and pro rata for part-time students. This study should be stand-alone, whole-class, in-person teaching, with any additional support, (small group tuition/online support), supplementary to these minimum classroom hours.
- We will apply funding reductions at half the national funding rate above the tolerance for every instance where a student's planned English and/or maths hours are below the minimum teaching hours. We will provide further details ahead of the academic year 2025 to 2026 on how we will be collecting this data, assessing compliance and applying funding reductions.
- Students must study maths and/or English as part of their programme in each academic year and for a minimum number of hours. This condition of funding also forms part of institutions' contract with Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA). We will remove funding from future allocations for students who do not meet this condition.

GLA Inclusion Charter launched in Camden

- Mayor of London Sadiq Khan has launched a charter to help tackle rising suspensions and absenteeism during a visit to Camden. London's Inclusion Charter has been developed by the Mayor of London's Violence Reduction Unit in partnership with young people, schools, education specialists and local authorities.
- The Charter is supported by a new £1.4 million partnership between the Mayor's VRU and UNICEF UK that will provide free resources and training to support inclusive practices for all state-funded school and education settings in London for the next four years.
